
Book Club Questions for

All the Whys of Delilah's Demise by Neve Maslakovic

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Thank you for reading *All the Whys of Delilah's Demise*. These questions are included in the ebook. Print them out for your paperback reading!

Whether you're discussing the book with a group or reflecting on your own, they are meant to spark conversation about Scottie's choices and New Seattle's world.

- 1. The ConnectChip and the People List echo our own technology-driven society. What real-world parallels did you see in the book's depiction of social media, AI, and personal branding?
- 2. The ranking system in New Seattle creates constant pressure to be liked. How does this affect people's morality and sense of self?
- 3. Delilah represents the pinnacle of success in New Seattle. Do you think she genuinely earned her position—or was she as trapped by the system as everyone else?
- 4. The ranking system touches every part of life in New Seattle: friendship, love, ambition, loyalty. What does the novel suggest about how competition changes our capacity for real connection?
- 5. Themes of **belonging and identity** run through Scottie's story, especially her curiosity about her origins. What does her desire to "be someone" really mean in a world where worth is numerically assigned?
- 6. The world of the Dome feels polished but claustrophobic. How does the physical setting mirror Scottie's emotional state?

- 7. Oliver's fate introduces moral questions about worth and disposability. What does the book seem to say about how society treats its "lowest-ranked"?
- 8. The dome offers safety but also confinement. What do you think the author is saying about comfort versus freedom?
- 9. Imagine living in a world like New Seattle. What would **your personal brand** look like, and how closely would it match who you really are?
- 10. The phrase "All the Whys" points to the network of human ambition—the combined hunger to be noticed, to be first. Which "why" felt most central to you by the end?
- 11. The story's ending leaves Scottie at a crossroads, envisioning the Dome in flames. Did you find the conclusion **hopeful, unsettling, or something in between**? Do you think Scottie will follow through on her vision and act to free herself and the people of New Seattle?
